Project Title	Building community and coordinated responses to harmful practices
Applicant Organisation	Brighton & Hove City Council
Project background	There is an accepted evidence base that a range of Violence against Women and Girls (VAWG) crime types – including harmful practices such as Female Genital Mutilation, Forced Marriage and 'Honour Based' Violence, as well as domestic violence & abuse, rape sexual violence & abuse – are underreported by victim/ survivors from Black Asian Minority Ethnic and Refugee (BAMER) communities. The reasons for underreporting are varied and include issues such as:  • Awareness of the scale and impact of these crime types  • The ability of state actors (e.g. criminal justice agencies, health sector, children's services) to provide an appropriate and timely response  • Lack of confidence among affected communities about their opportunities to access support – including barriers to help seeking which can hinder access to services – as well as the risk of secondary discrimination.  While harmful practices may occur within a specific context, and can be supported by collusive or enabling attitudes within any given community, it is important that these forms of violence & abuse are understood within the wider context of VAWG (Violence against Women and Girls), which affects all communities regardless of race, ethnicity or faith.

Develop and pilot working practices to protect BAMER (Black Asian Minority Ethnic and Refugee) victim/ survivors, including models of risk assessment and advocacy interventions within a criminal and civil justice setting

Develop and pilot group work and therapeutic interventions that support BAMER victim/survivors to cope and recover

Develop and pilot models / opportunities for work with men and boys in terms of prevention and education agenda

Develop best practice and a toolkit for professionals (Case studies, Toolkit guidance, Resource Pack, Specialist Themed Seminars)

Develop training resources for front line workers, helping them to identify and build confidence in delivering specific interventions, tailored to each country and reflecting on cultural differences

Develop an evaluation framework to assess the effectiveness of models / intervention across partner countries

Use a theory of change approach, to support an evaluation of impact (Methodology: Observation, Qualitative Interviews, Self Reflection Tools, Evaluation Measures/Scales)

Undertake dissemination activities, raising awareness of VAWG (Violence against Women and Girls) crime types that affect BAMBER (Black Asian Minority Ethnic and Refugee) communities through national and international networks, and promote ways of combatting it via regional seminars in partner countries, and publicise the project and its outputs to practitioners and policy makers.

<u>EU priorities</u>: This project is related to Justice EU policy, more specifically to Gender Equality priority with the objective of Ending gender-based violence.

Equality between women and men is one of the European Union's founding values. The Strategy for equality between women and men represents the European Commission's work program on gender equality for the period 2010-2015. comprehensive framework committing the Commission to promote gender equality into all its policies including for the following thematic priority: dignity, integrity and ending gender-based violence. Particularly, gender-based violence includes harmful practices such as forced marriages, female genital mutilation and so-called "honour" crimes.

Duration	The duration of the projects will be 24 months.
